I especially want to praise Transfer, our undergraduate-run journal, which published its 100th issue last Fall and the Poetry Center and American Poetry Archives that has established an exciting digitized presence on DIVA. Also, since many interesting departments have joined our newly reorganized college, possible collaborations with programs such as music, art (including book arts), theater, cinema, broadcast communications, history and other disciplines will be explored.

If you are a graduate of our program reading this newsletter, I appeal to you for help in the these hard times. The department is once again without a substantial budget for even the simplest supplies, not to mention greater goals such as more scholarships, sending students to conferences, and paying directors to assist with student plays. Let's work to continue to enrich the lives of our B.A., M.A. and M.F.A. writers and to lobby our national and state governments to make education a serious and constant priority.

Congratulations to the many of you who have published and had your work produced, who have edited anthologies and magzines, who have taught workshops and classes for children and adults, and who have enriched the writing community. We wish you continued growth in your writing and professional lives. Let us know when you do well – we are proud of you.

Faculty

Michelle Carter was commissioned to write a play for Symmetry Theatre, *Patience Worth*, which will open in September. Michelle received a grant from the SFSU Office of Research and Sponsored Programs to work on a radio play adaptation and a CD recording of *Dreamspiel*: A Ukelele Opera with the Ukulele Orchestra of Great Britain. Nona Caspers was promoted to Professor and she received a Cultural Equity Grant from the San Francisco Arts Foundation. Nona has work in and forthcoming in Black Warrior Review, Cimarron Review, Glimmer Train, Arroyo Literary Review and Green Mountains Review. She received an Open Fiction Award from Glimmer Train and they featured her metafictional essay "The Horse" in their Glimmer Train Writer's Bulletin. Maxine Chernoff's poetry collection A House in Summer is available, free, as an ebook from Argotist Online. Maxine will publish two poetry collections: To Be Read in the Dark (Omnidawn, October 2011) and Without (Shearsman, 2012). Maxine's work also appeared in Fourteen Hills, The Nation, Conjunctions, Iowa Review and Denver Quarterly. Anne Galjour's collaboration with the Robert Moses Kin Dance Company, Fable and Faith, premiered at the Yerba Buena Center for the Arts in February 2011. Paul Hoover's bilingual poetry volume, En el idioma y en la tierra, translated by Maria Baranda, will be published by Conculta, Mexico City, Fall 2011; in late Spring he toured Vietnam with the country's leading poets, Nguyen Duy, Pham Xuan Nguyen, head of the Hanoi Writers Association, and his co-translator, Nguyen Do, to read from Beyond the Court Gate: Selected Poems of Nguyen Trai (Counterpath Press, 2011). The group was interviewed on national television and radio and featured in all the leading newspapers. **Donna de la Perriere**'s book, Saint Erasure, was released from Talisman House December 2010; Donna continues to curate The Bay Area Poetry Marathon. Camille Dungy's latest poetry collection is Smith Blue (Southern Illinois University Press, 2011). She is the recipient of the 2011 Northern California Book Award in poetry, a Silver Medal Winner in the 80th California Book Award and a NAACP Image Award nominee for Suck on the Marrow (Red Hen Press, 2010). She has also been shortlisted for the 2011 Foreword Magazine Book of the Year Award. Camille has been promoted to Professor and awarded tenure here. **Toni** Mirosevich's new book of poems, The Takeaway Bin, was released by Spuyten Duyvil Press in 2010 as an outgrowth of her chapbook My Oblique Strategies (Frank O'Hara Award, 2005). Toni's work also appeared in Eleven Eleven, and Fourteen Hills, issue 17.2 alongside an interview. Toni is also the recipient of an ORSP grant. Camilly Roy's collection of poetry, Sherwood Forest,

was released in April 2011 (Futurepoem Books). This July, Alice La Plante's first novel, Turn of Mind was published by Atlantic Monthly Press. Stacy Doris's latest book of poetry. The Cake Part, is available from Publication Studio. Peter Orner's new novel, Love and Shame and Love will be published by Little, Brown this November; it has been excerpted in Granta, McSweeney's, Ploughshares, and New American Writing. Peter coedited with Annie Holmes (MFA 2008) Don't Listen to What I'm About to Say, a non-fiction collection of Zimbabwean narratives released in South Africa by Jonathon Ball Publishers. **Dan Langton's** 7th collection of poems, During Our Walks, came out from Blue Light Press. Ste**ve Dickison** reports that the American Poetry Archives has launched their digitized library, and the first years are available online through DIVA.

The play was also selected for the 2010 Bay Area Playwrights Festival. **Toni Graham** (MA 1992) has a short story published in Arroyo Literary Review, issue 3. Vinnie Hansen (MA 1980) has a short story, "Rooster and the Buster Brown Shoes," in the 25th anniversary edition of *The* Porter Gulch Review. Christopher Hayter (MFA 2011) will pursue a PhD in Creative Writing from Georgia State University, where he will receive full funding including tuition waiver and a generous six year stipend. He wishes to thank all the faculty and peers who helped him along the way. Nina LaCour (BA 2004) published her first novel, Hold Still, with Dutton Books in 2009, and her second book, The Disenchantments, is forthcoming in 2012. She is currently teaching a series of workshops on the craft of young adult fiction in San Francisco. Lily **Iona MacKenzie** (MA 1993) will have her poetry collection All This published by Little Red Tree Publishing in September 2011. Linda Watanabe McFerrin's (MA 1991) novel, Dead Love, is a 2010 Bram Stoker Award

Nominee for Superior Achievement in a Novel. Kristi Moos (MFA 2010) is now Assistant to the Publisher at Heyday Books of Berkeley. She recently started a literary iournal called *Poecology* (www.poecology.org). **Aífe** Murray's (MA 1994) Maid as Muse: How Servants Changed Emily Dickinson's Life and Language was nominated in the category of General Nonfiction in the 30th annual Northern California Book Awards. Jesse Nissim (MFA 2005) was published in the Arroyo Literary Review. Sandra Park's (MFA 2005) novella, If You Live in a Small House (Mutual Publishing, 2010) goes into a second printing this year; prose poems "Hagiography" and "Hagiography 2" appear in CrossBRONX and The Walrus; poetry and nonfiction forthcoming in Meridian, University of Virginia and two anthologies. Her work was nominated by St. Petersburg Review for Best New Poets 2011, and for a Ka Palapala Po'okela book award in Honolulu. **Josh Pelletier** (MFA 2011) published a Kindle Edition of his novel, On Our Way Home, which ranked 23rd within the first day. **Barbara Jane Reyes** (MFA 2005) had a short story published in issue 3 of the Arroyo Literary Journal. Sarah Rosenthal (MFA 1999) was interviewed about her book, A Community Writing Itself: Conversations with Vanguard Writers of the Bay Area for the launch of Poet As Radio, a new radio program hosted by Bay Area poets on KUSF. Canvon Sam (MFA 1998) received a fellowship from the Center for Asian American Media to write a screenplay based on her PEN Award winner, Sky Train: Tibetan Women on the Edge of History. She will be teaching Creative Nonfiction at Mills College this fall. Philip Schultz (BA English, 1967), 2008 Pulitzer Prize Winner for his sixth collection of poetry, Failure, was inducted into the SFSU Alumni Hall of Fame in May 2011. Nina Schuyler (MFA 2003) sold her second novel, Accidental Birds, to Vagabondage Press. One of her short stories, "The Bob Society," was nominated for a Pushcart Prize. She continues to teach creative writing at the University of San Francisco. Laurie Sleeper's (MFA 2004) short story, "Naomi and the Writer" won the Page to Stage story contest, a collaboration between Stories on Stage and the Lighthouse Writers Workshop in Denver, Colorado. Her story was performed by Stories on Stage in November, 2010. Roz Spafford (MA 1979) won the 2010 David Nathan Meyerson Prize for her short story, "Drought." She received \$1,000 and her story was published in Volume 95, Number 4 of the Southwest Review. Chad Sweeney's (MFA 2006) collection of poems Parable of Hide and Seek was released by Alice James Books, October 2010, he has a short story in the third edition of Arroyo Literary Review. He was hired as an assistant Professor at CSU, San Bernardino. Joan Tol**lifson** (MA 1989) published a new book, *Painting the* Sidewalk with Water: Talks and Dialogs about Nonduality, Non-Duality Press, 2010. **Don Waters** (MFA 2004) received a 2010 Christopher Isherwood Foundation Fiction Fellowship of \$4,000. Valerie S Hart's (MFA 2008) had her first full theater production. Her play, Rising & Falling, was produced by Rhubarb Theater Company, Nashville TN, this August. Forrest Gander (MA 1981) won a 2011 Witter Bynner Fellowship and a reading at the Library of Congress. Quintan Ana Wikswo's (MFA 2002) exhibit Prophecy of Place: photographs, poetry, video and assemblage will be on display at the Yeshiva University Museum at the Center for Jewish History in New York, August 14, 2011 - February 15, 2012. Daniel Orozco's (MA 1992) first story collection, Orientation And Other Stories (Faber & Faber, 2011) made the NY Times Book Review Editors' Choice in July. Jane Ciabattari (MA 1981) has work in the second issue of *The Literarian*, another piece will be anthologised in Long Island Noir, due out in Spring 2012 from Akashic Books. Jane will moderate a conversation /reading with NBCC prose finalists and winners, "Urban Mirrors," at The New School, and at the 2012 AWP conference in Chicago will host a National Book Critics Circle reading. Jane is currently NBCC Vice President/Online, after having served as NBCC president for the last three years. François Luong (MFA 2010) was a contributing editor and translated the work of eleven Québécois poets in New American Writing #29. Harold Terezon (MFA 2010) had work included in Strange Cargo, an Emerging Voices Anthology (Pen Center USA, 2010). The San Francisco Foundation has chosen Anhvu Buchanan (MFA 2010) the 2010 James Duval Phelan Award for his poetry manuscript The Disorder *Index*, **Roxanne Beth Johnson** (MFA 2011) for the 2010 Joseph Henry Jackson Award for her poetry manuscript Junkyard Sermon -whose second book, Black Crow Dress, will be published in 2012 by Alice James Books – and Dustin Heron (MA 2009) for the 2010 Tanenbaum Award for his manuscript My Soul is a Toy That Never Breaks.
